

Guidelines for Working with Evolon

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Important: Before beginning to work on the Evolon, practice on scraps of Evolon to get first-hand knowledge of how each art medium responds to the Evolon material.

For Background Colors:

- 1. Put down a plastic tablecloth on your painting surface. If you want an even background color, dampen the entire Evolon panel with water using a sponge. Then while still wet, apply the color of your choice using a damp sponge. If you want crisp lettering, allow panel to dry.
- 2. Often paint stores or hardware stores will donate leftover or returned household paint to the project. You can add acrylic paint to most of these paints to create a background color. Apply such paint directly to the panel with wide a brush, covering the panel completely. Allow to dry.
- 3. Note: Household surface paint on the Evolon tends to dry lighter than paint on canvas, fabric, etc.
- 4. Spray paint works well on Evolon. Some spray paint such as SUGAR professional acrylic paint is made with sugar and does not give off toxic odors. SUGAR gives a highly opaque matte finish.

For creating images and writing text:

- 1. If you want strong colors and color shapes with distinct edges, use paints undiluted with water. These work well:
 - Acrylic on gessoed surface or over an area that was previously painted
 - Acrylic without gesso (not quite as clear edges)
 - Simple watercolor box paints
 - Fabric paint (Neopaque will give a crisper edge, Lumiere will bleed a bit.)
- 2. For a softer wash of color or shapes with soft edges:
 - Dilute any of the above with water (edges will soften and bleed).
 - Tee Juice markers by Jacquard will create an effect more like heavy charcoal
- 3. When using pencils:
 - Pencils can be used to sketch images. Paint can then be used over the pencil outlines.
 - Pencils should only be used very lightly because pencil marks do not erase on this material.
- 4. For freehand letters:
 - All markers will bleed a little, so allow space between letters so they don't bleed together (test on a scrap first). Use a light touch. Edges will soften a little. Markers with broad tips will tend to bleed more than fine-point markers.
 - Tulip fine point fabric markers and Marvy fine point markers work best for clear, small letters.
 - All Sharpies will bleed some but can be used.
 - Paint your letters with any of the paints listed in #1.
- 5. For stenciling letters:
 - Use a small piece of sponge and acrylic paint. Use small amounts of paint and dab firmly.
 - Use markers (some will bleed at the edges, especially on unpainted areas).
- 6. When using crayons:
 - Crayons work on Evolon and can be used under paint or over paint. Crayons will be brighter if used over a painted layer.
- 7. For sewing:
 - Fabric can be added to the panel with ragged edges or finished edges.
 - Sew fabric by hand (with a sharp needle) or by machine.
- 8. To preserve the life of the Vision Quilt, please do not use glue or adhesive.
- 9. Spray Scotch Guard or some kind of acrylic sealer on panels to prevent wear.
